



DEVELOPMENT

These contributions support dayto-day operations, covering salaries, utilities, maintenance, and supplies in all departments. In 2023, contributions supporting The Mountain were \$428,552.

Because we try to keep registration fees low to encourage as much participation as possible, our goal is for registration revenue to provide about 75% of The Mountain's annual budget, with donations supplementing the other 25%. See pie chart for categories of support.

CAPITAL CAMPAIGN

After establishing our first Capital Campaign committee in May 2021, we enthusiastically launched this generational investment in The Mountain that extends from 2023 to 2026. Throughout 2023, \$1,811,000 was contributed and pledged toward our goal of \$3.2+ million.

These funds will be used to provide upgrades to guest and staff housing (photo above), meeting and office spaces, as well as the electrical systems, dining hall, and the tower. During Homecoming in May of 2023, we broke ground on our new staff housing (photo below) which will be ready for residents in mid-2024.



GRANTS & ENDOWMENT FUND

GRANTS

SOUTHFACE GOOD USE GRANT

Southface Energy Institute is a nonprofit organization, engaged in promoting resource-efficient workplaces, homes, and communities throughout the Southeast.

\$75,000 awarded awarded and matched for a **total of \$150,000** to provide for new HVAC systems in the Commons and Rec Hall, mini-split systems for cabins, LED lighting and more.

LAUREL GARDEN CLUB

This local organization aids in protecting and conserving of our natural resources and partners with other like-minded organizations.

\$1495.36 award was used for fruit trees and berry bushes in the food forest as well as native wildflower seeds to beautify The Mountain entrance.

WILD AZALEA GARDEN CLUB

Focusing heavily on educational events, this group supports local projects in the service of horticulture and conservation.

\$983.21 award was used to support mushroom education projects by providing supplies for events.

MOUNTAIN FINDINGS

A local resale store empowering change by using profits from sales to provide grants, scholarships, and donations for our local community.

\$12,000 awarded and matched for a total of **\$24,000** total used for greenhouse furnishings, lighting, irrigation, and supplies for workshops and growing mushrooms.

RACIAL HEALING INITIATIVE

Part of the Retreat Center Collaboration, RHI provides training, technical assistance, and support to strengthen the capacity of retreat centers to advance racial healing and systemic change in their organizations.

\$25,000 awarded to strengthen the capacity of The Mountain to advance racial healing and systemic change.

TOTAL ASSETS ON DECEMBER 31, 2023: \$708,030

We are so grateful to report that the Endowment Fund grew by just over \$100,000 in 2023. Donors contributed \$52,015 to keep the fund healthy and the performance of the market contributed to the remainder of the fund's growth in 2023.

OVERVIEW OF FINANCIAL POSITION

As the Board's Financial Advisor, I'm pleased Operating Revenue of \$957,582 is the to once again report that the Mountain's financial health and balance sheet remains strong. Net Assets increased \$1,469,960 to \$3,707,456, and we remain debt free

Total assets of \$4,524,912 are comprised primarily of Cash and Property & Equipment, well exceeding total liabilities of just \$110,089.

Summary of Revenue and Expenses

In 2023, total revenue and support was \$2,712,272 (including \$1,269,183 from the Capital Campaign, \$957,582 Operating Revenue, and \$485,507 Contributed Revenue). Total expenses were \$1,262,138, resulting in \$1,450,134 net income. Again, this tremendous result was primarily fueled by generous donations to the Capital Campaign.

highest in more than 10 years, and a 21.7% increase over prior year.

Program revenue of \$957,231 was up \$207,639 from prior year. This was primarily from increases in UU Retreats and Youth Camps, as the impacts of Covid-19 continued to fade.

Contribution revenue of \$1,754,690 was up \$1,174,907 over prior year. This increase is due to the Capital Campaign. The support from our community continues to be strong, as seen in Capital Campaign pledges and donations, as well as in our development efforts. The Mountain was able to utilize these contributions to invest in much needed staff housing and other projects.

Total expenses of \$1,262,138 was \$29,884 below prior year.

Overall Observations

The Mountain's 2023 financial results continue to remain strong. Smiles, music, and activity have fully returned to The Mountain, with Covid-19 in the rear-view mirror. The Capital Campaign is wellunderway and is funding much needed staff housing and a costly repair to the dam. Net income has been positive for the 12th consecutive year and net assets have continued to grow. There is much to celebrate!






