

There was great excitement at the final Serendipity at Summer Institute, when J.P. and Judy Newell's life membership raised the pledge total over a quarter of a million dollars. Since then, the total has grown to \$275,000. \$55,000 more to go.

The total represents pledges from most of our Southeastern UU societies. In fact, of the 37 societies whose membership is 100 or greater, only 4 do not have a pledging member: Gainesville, FL; Orlando, FL; Chattanooga, TN; and New Orleans, LA.

BOARD SETS GOALS — RAISES COST OF LIFE MEMBERSHIPS

The Highlands Camp & Conference Center Board met at Summer Institute and completed its work on goals and objectives for the corporation. These will be presented to the membership for ratification at the Annual Meeting.

The Board also extended the time limit on charter life memberships to January 15, 1981. A new class of membership was created—the life membership, as opposed to the *charter* life membership—which will be available January 15th. The cost will be \$1600 within a year or \$2000 over five years.

Church groups found the spring work weekends a way to build their own community spirit while working together for the camp. Individuals and families are also welcome, during the week and weekends. EVALUATIONS PRAISE MOUNTAIN

A total of 199 responded to questionnaires about *THE MOUNTAIN* at Summer Institute. Of these, only 30% had actually been to *THE MOUNTAIN*, but their comments are worth repeating:

"An absolutely emotional, spiritual experience."

"It's UUs with roots!!"

"Going there is like the supreme religious experience."

"A community & identity building facility—a place to call OURS which demonstrates our values—a place to rest and to play."

"My comments aren't likely to be constructive—I'm too much in love with the place to be objective!"

Of those who hadn't been to *THE MOUNTAIN*, 47% gave lack of time as the reason; 22% gave distance; and 19% gave no reason. Only 13% listed cost as a deciding factor.

In general, people seem to view *THE MOUNTAIN* as a place for UUs to retreat to and be rejuvenated in the fellowship of other UUs. We agree!


MOUNTAIN RECEIVES BIG COVERAGE
