NOMINATING COMMITTEE GUIDELINES SET

The following guidelines were approved by The Board at its recent meeting:

The nominating committee shall request suggestions for nominations for the membership for vacancies on the Board of Trustees via THE MOUNTAIN Newsletter.

Deadline for receiving these names is May 1.

Nominations by petition will be accepted until September 1. Petitions must be signed by at least 25 members of *THE MOUNTAIN* and submitted to the Secretary. Petitioners will be identified on the ballot.

The nominating committee shall present a slate of at least two candidates for any elected position on the Board and nominating Committee.

The slate shall be published in THE MOUNTAIN Newsletter mailed nearest June 30, allowing the summer for campaigning by the candidates.

The positions on the nominating committee to be filled each year shall consist of 1 one-year term and 1 two-year term, with the exception of 1981, in which 2 one-year terms and 1 two-year term will be filled.

No less than 30 days prior to the Annual Meeting the nominating committee shall send a mail ballot to the membership for election of members to the Board of Trustees and to the Nominating Committee.

CEP AT THE MOUNTAIN

What do nearly 50 couples in the Mid-South District have in common? Answer—A Couple Enrichment Program (CEP) weekend.

And what, you ask, is CEP?

CEP, sponsored by the UUA, and led by Faith and Roger Comstock (5 times since Fall, 1978), is an opportunity for couples to explore together the joys, needs and expectations each bring to their relationship. CEP was created for Unitarian Universalists using the Catholic Marriage Encounter as a model. A CEP weekend is being offered at THE MOUNTAIN, May 15-17 (Friday evening through Sunday noon).

Participants learn techniques designed to help them confront and appreciate differences, explore and express them openly in a positive atmosphere and work towards finding ways to accept and bridge them in a mutually satisfying fashion.

There is opportunity for limited group interaction, but the primary workshop activities are conducted between partners, and their privacy is protected.
