

The Mountain's Counselor-In-Training program is an exciting way to enhance your leadership capacity, providing opportunities to work effectively with youth and also develop other great skills. In each camp session, CIT's responsibilities include assisting counselors with cabin activities, spending one night in the cabin with campers and counselors and helping facilitate Family Councils. CITs also plan Field Day, co-facilitate a camp workshop and design and lead an evening program. Each week, CITs have 1 day off; they'll also have 1 training and education day in adventure skills, youth development and other areas of interest.

Beginning Camp Sunday, June 29 – Saturday, July 5 Rising 1st through 3rd Graders

A loving atmosphere is created for our youngest campers, many of whom are away from home for the first time. Beginning camp allows children to "get their feet wet" in the fun and adventure of camp, and may be the beginning of a life-long relationship with The Mountain and its values — not to mention the new friends made here! Campers have the opportunity to explore nature and develop an understanding of their place in nature with lots of outdoor activities that are fun and educational. This is a very special place for children to experience their first camp.

For new campers and Beginning Camp "graduates" alike, Elementary camp gives children the chance to choose a number of their own activities – workshops and trips – and to participate in creating evening worship services

with their cabin. This year, all campers will get to be part of an overnight "camp out" at the base of The Mountain; there will also be other adventures such as tubing and lake rafting. One morning will be devoted to on-site community service projects that affirm the importance of giving to others — and, of course, evening programs, field play and arts and crafts are an

Junior High Camp Sunday, June 15 – Friday, June 27 Rising 7th through 9th Graders

Campers experience many of the same adventure and community components as Junior High . . . but there are also new elements incorporated into the program. These include the 24-hour hike experience, more freedom and responsibility, more indepth focus on social justice, values clarification and personal growth. Senior High Camp Theme and evening programs are designed and led by Spirits (camper peers. Senior High Camp is about discovery, deepening, and absolute magic!

Work & Adventure I: Paddle Sunday, June 15 – Friday, June 27 \$1238

How about whitewater paddling (and swimming!) on rivers that swim wild and free over rocks worn smooth by ages of water . . . you'll learn how to move around these rivers with a canoe and a paddle. You'll master the basic skills and then progress to more fun and advanced maneuvers. You'll become one with the river, your boat and your paddle and through this connection, experience grace, power, and mystery.

Work & Adventure II: Hike Sunday, June 29 – Friday, July 11 \$1042

Or maybe you'd like to go backpacking over the oldest mountains in the world. You'll be carrying everything you need: food, shelter, water, pots, pans, and stoves. Your fellow adventurers will be a small, fully functioning community out in the woods where you'll experience nature as few people have the opportunity to do these days.

Work & Adventure III: Climb Sunday, July 23–Saturday, July 26 \$1085

Or you can go rock climbing on tall cliffs of granite and gneiss, learning to notice the imperfections in the stone that make climbing possible, the rough faces that you wedge your foot against and small ledges you can stand on with relative ease. You'll feel the warmth of the stone on your hands as you reach for the next hold. As you reach the top of the climb you'll look out over the valley while the warm air blows and the falcons dance on thermals above your head.
